Due to an Eastern snowstorm, the Board was unable to assemble a quorum on Saturday, January 21. Those present (Berry, Browne, Green, Rowell, and Wennerstrom) met for about three hours. With the arrival of Allen Forte, a quorum was assembled Sunday morning for a meeting at the University of Michigan School of Music. These minutes are of the latter meeting.

- 1. Minutes of November 20, 1977 were approved as corrected.
- 2. President's report. Mr. Forte reported that attempts to seek <u>funding</u> for the Society had not achieved success as yet: the ACLS does not fund societies; Martha Baird Rockefeller had not responded as yet; the NEH was doubtful, but it was noted that the NEH may be useful for matching funds (\$1 for every \$3 raised by SMT) in future years.
- 3. Secretary's report. Mr. Browne reported that the <u>recount of the election</u> of Board members conducted by John Hanson had resulted in the election of Lewis Rowell to the Board. The <u>officers</u> nominated on November 20 last have been ratified by the mail vote of the Board. Mr. Hanson's minutes of the NCMT2 meeting of November 19 last, the ballots and records of counting, and other materials pertaining to the founding of the Society are in the files of the Secretary.
- 4. Mr. Berry moved and Mr. Rowell seconded that an ad hoc committee on incorporation and By-Laws be appointed. Passed. Mr. James Harrison will chair the committee, which will include Allen Forte and Gerald Warfield.
- 5. Publication of National Conference on Music Theory #2 papers. The CMS is unwilling to guarantee publication of all NCMT2 papers in its Symposium; the Board agreed not to set any SMT precedent that would indicate that all future Conference papers would necessarily be guaranteed publication. Moved (Berry-Wennerstrom) to appoint the Society's publications committee, a standing committee to consist, at first, of David Beach (chairman), Wallace Berry, William Benjamin, and Gary Wittlich. The committee should proceed to find out which NCMT2 papers are available and make recommendations to the Board as to which should be published in cooperation with CMS. It was agreed that the SMT should publish a Journal each year containing some of the papers presented at the national meeting, plus possibly some papers submitted, and including an account of the Proceedings of conference business meetings. A Newsletter is also envisaged, to be published by the Secretary. A Directory of the SMT membership was also approved in principle
- 6. Public annoncement of the Society and call to membership. Moved (Wennerstrom-Green) to 1) proceed with a call to membership (written by Browne, produced by Wennerstrom and Kliewer, and distributed by CMS to its @4100 Code 15 theorists). (CMS calculates that it spent \$917.75 on the NCMT2; it is likely that theory registration fees exceeded that sum, so CMS is willing to do this mailing for the SMT); 2) announcements will also be sent to the Evanston participants, to schools having active students in theory, and to major musical news outlets; 3) when the Society has publications to present, efforts will be made to contact libraries with regard to subservibing to them;

- (6.cont.)4) the treasurer will receive dues and other income and keep lists of membership status and send a postcard containing a membership "card" to each member, while the secretary will also keep a membership address file for mailings. Passed.
 - 7. Dues. The single year dues shall be \$18 for regular membership; \$8 for students; \$22 for dual membership (two members at same address-one copy of publications); and \$12 for institutional membership (publications only-available to institutions only). Members shall receive the Society's Journal (for the year in which the annual meeting of their paid membership occurred), its Newsletter and other publications, and such other benefits as may be available (e.g., possibility of reduced registration fees at conferences, etc.). The dues structure was moved by Rowell-Wennerstrom. Passed.
 - -- N.B. Board members may note that, if the above is correct, I have misrepresented the Institutional fee as \$18 in the application form now being sent out by CMS. Since it isn't being sent to institutions, this can be corrected when institutions are approached. Sorry...-R.B.
 - 8. Moved (Browne-Rowell) that the Society's president be authorized to investigate the scheduling of future meetings of the SMT by establishing planning contacts with CMS, ASUC, Ethnomusicology, and others, as stated in principle in the minutes of the Board's November 20, 1977 meeting. Passed.
 - 9. Budget. Draft budgets for 1978 by Browne and Wennerstrom were discussed. Ms. Wennerstrom's, being more detailed, became the model, and after considerable discussion was approved. It is based upon assumptions with regard to membership income and Societal expenditures; Ms. Wennerstrom agreed to to rework the draft and distribute it to the Board. Moved (Browne-Berry) to accept. Passed.
 - 10. Moved (Berry-Browne) that the Society shall reimburse Board members for air economy travel to Board meetings, for other travel not exceed air economy costs, and for other items of travel expense appropriate for remuneration as shall be presented to the Board. Passed.
 - 11. Moved (Green-Forte) that the treasurer shall establish a checking account and that the secretary and the treasurer shall be authorized to sign checks on the Society's account. Passed.
 - 12. Future agenda items. a) Drafting a policy declaration for SMT

Dear Colleague:

Preliminary program planning for the first meeting of the Society for Music Theory is underway. As you know, we will be meeting concurrently with the AMS in Minneapolis, October 20-21, 1978 (the AMS meeting is October 19-22).

With this letter the Program Committee invites the membership, faculty and students, to submit proposals for our consideration. These proposals may be in the form of an already existing paper or as an abstract of a paper. The Committee solicits proposals in the topical areas of the History of Theory, Pedagogy of Theory (particularly, new approaches to the teaching of music theory), and "new" analytic procedures applied to "old" music. The committee also seeks proposals for papers on topics other than those mentioned.

It is anticipated that the program next October will include several Special Interest Sessions to be conducted by a discussion leader. Suggestions for topics or discussion leaders are welcome. Some topics that have been proposed are: Semiotics-linguistics, aesthetics, performance and music theory, etc.

At its first meeting the Program Committee agreed that copies of the papers are to be distributed beforehand to each panel member and the moderator of the session on which a paper is to be presented. It was also agreed that it is highly desirable for the author to provide copies of the paper, or in lieu of that, an abstract for distribution to those attending the sessions. All papers presented at the October meeting will be considered for possible publication by the Publications Committee; decisions for publication will be made by that committee.

The deadline for submitting proposals is April 28, 1978. You will be notified by mid-June if your proposal has been selected. Send your proposals to me at Indiana University.

Dear Richmond:

At a recent meeting (on June 17) of the Board of the Music Theory Society of New York State there was a brief discussion of the current status of the national Society for Music Theory and the question was raised regarding the <u>relationship</u> of state/regional groups to the national group, and whether the Board of the SMT has had any discussion concerning this issue. During the week previous to our board meeting I had tried to reach Allen Forte by phone to get information from him on this matter, but I was unable to reach him.

After our board meeting, I thought it was best to write to you (as secretary of the SMT) to ask specifically what information you have, and, if possible, to send me any board meeting minutes or discussion summaries (or any specific guidelines, if some have been drawn up at this point) that would be pertinent to the issue.

If the board of the SMT has had no discussion regarding this relationship between the national group and state/regional groups, then I would request that such a discussion become an agenda item for the SMT board (and/or a committee) in the reasonably near future.

Speaking for the Music Theory Society of New York State, I know that its members value highly its current status, format, and organizational set-up, and will guard jealously its independence. However, it seems reasonable to assume that there can be mutual benefits which the national and the state/regional groups should consider, and I am sure that the MTSNYS would be open to and willing to participate in such considerations. (At this point, the MTSNYS is not approaching the SMT with any specific proposals, but I think that some "cooperative areas" to consider would include: 1. Combined dues, to result in some saving for those people belonging to both the national and a regional group. 2. Shared information on dates and sites of meetings, to avoid unnecessary conflicts. 3. Sharing information on the planning of programs. 4. Sharing mailing lists and mailing expenses. 5. Cooperation in the area of publications.)



Readers of Perspectives of New Music may wish to know of the existence of a new national learned society whose concerns impinge directly upon contemporary music. The Society for Music Theory was voted in existence at a November 1977 meeting of the 2nd Mational Conference on Music Theory, incld in Evanston at Northwestern University.

The new organization was preceded by several years confidention and preliminary meetings, assisted by the College Music Society, the American Society of University Composers, and various universities.

This the intent of the SME to foster music theory in the full intellectual and promagogical array. The Society is incorporated, has By-Laws and an executive board elected in Evanston, and will pursue the objectives defened by those entities: an annual mational meeting (usually with a similar music society), publication of a journal, proceedings, and newsletter, and warm encouragement (though) not direct supervision) of any and all state and regional theory activities.

The first SMT national conference will be held with the AMS meetings in Minneapolis 10ctober 20-21, 1978. Future meetings planned include Fall 1979 (with CNS in San Antonio) and projected 1980 and 1981 dates on the West and East coasts, respectively.

The first executive board of the SMT was elected at Evanston and intends to represent regions and interest as broadly and fairly as possible. Its members are Allen Forte, president (Yale); Wallace Berry, vice-president (University of British Columbia, Vancouver); Richmond Browne, secretary (University of Michigan); Mary Wennerstrom, treasurer (Indiana University);

Elaine Barkin (UCLA); Douglass Green (University of Texas);
Arthur Badford (January College)
Arthur January (Radford College); Leo Kraft (Queens College CUMY);
Lewis Rowell (University of Hawaii); and Peter Westergaard (Princeton).

Barly evidence of support for the new society is seen in the ca. 400 members already enlisted for 1978. In order to publish papers from the Evanston conference as the Society's first journal issue, and in order to bring about effective conferences and activities, the SMT must have active participation by theorists across the country. Membership is \$18 per year.(1978 members recorded as founding members); student fee \$8; dual membership (two ate one private address; one copy of publications) \$22; and institutional (library) membership \$18-payable to the Society's treasurer.

As a longtime board member of the American Society of University Composers, I have witnessed the difficulties of bringing about professional intercourse in our diverse and displaned condition. With institutional and individual effort, the Society for Music Theory hopes to bring music and cognition to bear upon the professional lives of those who practice both.

Dear Allen:

Thanks for sending the sample pages of "Music Theory Spectrum". I was delighted to see how far you have gotten in such a short time. The layout of the front matter is clear and handsome. There is only one aspect that I find disturbing — the fact that the design is so immediately identifiable with that of the old JMT. In view of the fact that our ptoential readers may tend to confuse a journal of the Society for Music Theory with JMT under the best of conditions, I think it essential that we not encourage that confusion by our choice of design. I realize that the formats are very different but unfortunately, the styles are so strikingly similar that anyone who has seen both will immediately connect them.

Please understand that this is in no sense a criticism of Sharland's design per se. On its own merits it is an excellent design. The problem is that her style is so distinctive and -- at least for readers whose only contact with that style has been through JMT -- the implications of the similarity potentially so misleading.

For this reason I feel strongly that it would be in the best interests of the Society to come up with a different design. I realize that to change the design at this point might be expensive and might mean not being able to have samples ready for our Minneapolis meeting, but I think the design as it stands could lead to serious problems of identity for the journal, and therefore for the Society. I am therefore sending copies of this letter to the other members of the Board. If my qualms are shared by others, I think we should discuss the problem at our Minneapolis meeting.

The board of the SMT has asked that I respond to your most timely and helpful letter regarding the relation(s) between the SMT and regional/state theory groups.

Your letter served as a focus of discussion at our board meeting in New Haven on July 1. I apologize for the lateness of this response.

May I address the items you raised --

- 1) The SMT is mindful of the varied nature and construction of theory at state and regional levels. It does not seem useful for a national forum to try to manage any aspect of affairs so distributed -- so the present SMT board intends to offer help and encouragement, to share information and advice, but does not contemplate becoming the legal or financial locus of local activity.
- 2) Thus the SMT would not, for instance, want to combine its dues structure with state groups. Recognizing that the MTS/NYS is the largest and best-organized local society, and one whose senior example the SMT gratefully acknowledges, the SMT realizes that it must work with many kinds of theory activities of widely differing format and intent. Our dues structure is deliberately low enough so that persons wishing to belong to both national and local groups could presumably afford both. (The price of our national conference registration will vary depending upon the co-sponsor.)
- 3) Similarly, merging our mailing operations seems an unmanageable matrix, but sharing our mailing lists and echoing our announcements mutually seems quite reasonable. I hope that I can receive information about your scheduled meetings in time to both "avoid" them (i.e., not conflict with them) and help advertise themand the SMT would be happy if you could reciprocate in that kind of planning.

4) SMT publications will include a journal (Music Theory Spectrum, edited by Bryan Simms) which will publish papers from our conferences, selected other papers, and our Proceedings; and a Newsletter (edited by me) which will occasionally publish a Directory of SMT members. MTS/NYS already has a similar publication structure; perhaps the two societies should establish a communications channel in order to exchange information -- and in order to be sure that we don't inadvertently coincide in some publishing decision. SMT's chairman of publications is David Beach.

The SMT board, as presently constituted, thus sees no likelihood that formal links (joint membership or dues, "chapters" of the SMT, etc.) between national and local theory organizations will be formed. People will decide on which levels they feel most useful, most likely to be served -- one hopes that many will see the reasonability of belonging to more than one level.

Please continue to let us know what your Society feels in these and all other regards. I wish I could attend your conference this weekend; it looks most intriguing!

May I, not at all by the way, extend to you personally the SMT board's thanks for your minutes of our founding meeting in Evanston.

Stefan Kostka sent me a letter (and a copy to you) concerning the suggestion of a meeting for SMT board members and representatives from state and regional organizations at next year's meeting of SMT.

The idea of such a meeting resulted from conversations I had with Richmond Browne at the time of the SMT Minneapolis meeting. I think that Richmond and I felt that this would be a means to establish a point of communication between SMT and state and regional organizations, and he told me he would bring up the idea for discussion at a SMT board meeting. I also discussed the possibility of such a meeting with Arthur Jannery (and I think it came up in a conversation I had with Doug Green). Then in a conversation with Stefan (at Minneapolis) I mentioned it to him since he is chairing the program committee for the 1979 meeting.

I had assumed that the SMT board would discuss the issue, but I had not given thought to directing anything to you in writing.

The suggestion is simply to schedule a time, perhaps a luncheon, for some or all of the SMT board to meet with selected representatives from state and regional organizations. I have no formal agenda in mind, but it would seem logical for a small committee to propose a few discussion topics on which state and regional representatives might have some feelings or opinions, and leave time as well for anyone attending to ask questions for immediate response or to raise issues for longer-term consideration. Naturally, state and regional organizations would have to be notified in advance and asked to select representatives, and perhaps to prepare relevant information or questions for presentation. I would hope that the SMT board will discuss the possibility of such a meeting. As you well know, I feel strongly that it is important to provide possibilities for communication and interchange between the SMT and state organizations. If it does not seem practical or possible to arrange such a luncheon meeting, perhaps the SMT board will consider other possibilities to provide for communication.

In the light of my recent letter to you concerning the possibility of MTSNYS joining with SMT for the 1979 convention, it might be especially meaningful and beneficial to schedule a luncheon meeting as I have suggested (or provide some alternative) to aid in establishing lines of communication.
